Doug Hebert (Sculptor's Group Chair)

Q. What inspires you?

A. There is no one particular thing that inspires me, my pieces are mostly organic in form and almost always consist of a base with an animal(s) attached/mounted on them. These are the only parameters I've ever set for myself. Anything I've ever seen or experienced in my life is used as inspiration. A lot of my subconscious mind comes through and blends with my subconscious mind. My sculptures are a result.



Q. Who got you interested in art?

A. I started drawing when I was about four years old and I really never stopped. I drew He-man guys and Care Bears for my sister and it just carried on, I never stopped. Drawing progressed to painting, then sculpture. I love doing all three, but I had incredibly supportive parents and a terrific art program throughout middle and high school. I owe most of my consistent interest in art to those two factors. My parents were the major driving factor when it came to perusing art, even though they are not artists themselves, (nobody in my family is) their continued support made me into the artist I am now.

Q. When did you decide to become an artist?

A. Well, I strongly believe that when it comes to any art, visual, music, theatre, it chooses you. Whether it's a hobby or your job in life, it consumes you. I could not do anything else, it's what I've always wanted to do and it's something I will do until the day I die.

Q. What medium do you work in?

A. Right now, I work in paper clay when creating anything sculptural. I discovered paper clay four years ago and It is my 3d medium of choice, there is nothing else out there like it for what I do. I also love working with pastels, charcoal, colored pencil, acrylic paint, oil paint, you name it. My first love was a classic #2 pencil and I think that will always be my first choice for any 2d work. Everything I've ever created, weather it be in pastel, paint, colored pencil, even marker, began with pencil. To me, drawing is the basis for developing a feel for just about every other 2d medium that exists.

Q. What medium that you don't work in would you like to work in?

A. Compressed paper sculpting and 3d printing

Q. What artists do you most admire?

A. Augusta Rodin, Hieronymus Bosch, and Michelangelo

Q. If you could go back in time, what artist would you like to talk with?

A. I'd love to talk with Hieronymus Bosch

Q. What would you like to express through your art?

A. I wish to express an open mindedness that is somewhat random in form and color and to bring the world that is in my mind out into reality through paper clay. For me, the meaning behind all of my work is up for interpretation by the viewer. I am not conscious of any deep meaning behind my work, but that does not mean that it doesn't exist

Peering inside the Dragon, my summer tour of 9 Chinese cities, by David Bradley

Part 1

As faculty at Paradise Valley Community College, I have the good fortune to have access to funding for approved projects that can positively improve my classroom teaching. I obtained funding to spend five weeks early this summer to tour 9 cities and the Fine Arts Universities and Art Academies to learn how their system of higher education functions and document the exhibitions of graduate students in sculpture at all of these institutions. The results of my experience surprised me.

The opportunity came about through my friendship with a Chinese artist: Luo Xiao Ping. We have been good friends since 2001, and have together led students from Arizona to China for study abroad programs, and worked together on making sculpture, and had many stimulating discussions about the differences between China and the US.

In 2010, Xiao Ping proposed an idea to the Shanghai Public Art Department that they sponsor an exhibition of sculpture made by graduates of China's Fine Arts institutions, and the sculptures in the exhibition be purchased from the students and used as public art in Shanghai's booming construction. This is a win-win situation for both Shanghai and the students, as Shanghai amasses a collection of quality sculpture to decorate its many new public buildings and offices and public spaces, and the students receive income from the sale of their sculpture and the acclaim by having their work selected for the exhibition. The first exhibition was a big success with national TV coverage of the reception, and many high government officials attending. It was held again in 2011, 2013 and will be held again in September of this year. 62 students were selected this year. I accompanied Xiao Ping as he viewed the exhibitions, met the students and chose what he considered to be the best from each school.

We started in Shanghai on May 20th at the China Academy of Art, Shanghai School of Design. 3 students were selected from a class of 30 students. From there we flew to Tianjin, northeast of Beijing, and the site of the recent horrific explosions of toxic chemicals. Tianjin has a population of over 11 million people, and is typical of the cities we visited: many new high rise apartment towers, and new highways, clogged with new automobiles, reflecting China's rapid growth of its economy. The Tianjin Fine Arts University has 30,000 students, who choose between majoring in Design, Fine Art, Industrial Design, and Architecture. As in America, graduates with a degree in Fine Art are having trouble finding employment. A generation ago, there were fewer students who could afford to go to college in China, so all graduates were assured of either a teaching position or in a factory as a designer, now there are 10 times as many graduates as when their instructors graduated. I spoke to many who expressed a dream of coming to the US and seeking opportunities here.

We were in the midst of exhibition season across China as the school term was ending, students graduating, and holding their exhibitions all at the same time, so we did not have much time to spend at each location. Our travels went like this: arrive by plane or by bullet train to a city; be picked up by a faculty member or graduate student and driven, sometimes for an hour, to the university, jump out of the car, rapidly tour the galleries, photographing as I went, Xiao Ping choosing 3-5 works for consideration; returning to a faculty office to wait for the students selected to arrive; Xiao ping then laid out the proposal that their work was selected and did they want to participate(all did of course), then we were taken to a restaurant for a huge dinner hosted by the faculty from the university, then to the hotel, get up in the morning, go to the airport or train station and on to the next city to repeat the process. We went from Tiajin to Wuhan, then to Guangzhou, in the far south, then to Hangzhou, close to Shanghai, then to Jingdezhen, all within five days.
